

Michigan Nature Association 2025 – 2026 Field Trip Grants

Frequently Asked Questions

1. Who may apply for the nature field trip grants?

Any accredited public or private K-12 school may apply for the grants in the state of Michigan. Priority will be given to schools that have limited access to natural areas due to financial, geographic and socioeconomic factors.

2. What can the nature field trip grants be used for?

Grants can cover bus transportation and educational supplies (e.g., water test kits, field guides, binoculars, etc.) related to a field trip to a qualified natural area. Qualified natural areas include MNA nature sanctuaries, community nature centers, state parks and other appropriate locations. 3. How much funding does each grant provide?

Up to \$500 will be awarded per selected organization.

4. When are grant applications due and when are awards made?

To be considered for a Fall 2025 grant, applications should be submitted by Friday, September 12th, 2025. To be considered for a Spring 2026 grant, applications should be submitted by Friday, November 14th, 2025.

We expect to issue awards for Fall 2025 trips during the week of September 19th, 2025. Spring 2026 awards will be announced early February 2026.

5. How do I apply?

6. What is the review process for the grants?

A review committee of representatives from the Michigan Nature Association will select grant recipients based on the field trip grant evaluation criteria. See criteria on our website, <u>here</u>.

7. What are the criteria MNA will use to review grant applications?

The committee uses a decision making scoring rubric. We seek grants for trips that will connect students to the natural world and science standards at the state, district and school levels. MNA gives strong consideration to awarding grants to schools with limited access to natural areas due to financial, geographic and socioeconomic factor. MNA also seeks to fund trips that are aligned with our 'areas of conservation focus', including vernal pools; native prairies and savannas; fens, bogs, and other peatlands; and rare birds. In some cases, grants can be provided for professional development opportunities that enhance a teacher's ability to provide outdoor, experiential environmental education.

8. What type of grant reporting is required?

A final report through Google Forms, provided by MNA, and at least three photos from the trip featuring students in the natural area. (Grant recipients must secure parental permission for distribution of photos.)
